## Clothing designer Dana Buchman talks to local women about lifestyle and fashion

| Remember that party you met what's-his-name? <br> Well, you've just run into him again at the grocery store. Furtively scanning your memory for his name, you draw a complete blank. It's only after you've tried to fake your way through a conversation and made it through the checkout line that his name cumes flooting back too late, of course, to save you from embarrassment. <br> We've all had this and similar experiences. It's especially common in these days of information overload. The names of people and places, electronic PIN numbers and the ever-elusive location of the car keys vanish from our minds, dangling just beyond our reach at the very moment we need them. <br> They usually pop back, alas, when we're already late for work done. This is called age-related memory loss, and it happens to everyone, more often as we grow older. It's not only maddening, we can't help but wonder if it's the beginning of Alzheimer's disegge. <br> Memory problems and Alzheimer's disease have become so firmly linked in most people's minds that we rarely think of one without the other. ## Keep children away from lead, paint chips

| Despite efforts at education and prevention, children in Wayne County continue to be poisoned by lead from peeling lead-based paint, lead-contaminsted dust and other sources in their homes. <br> Almost one million preschool age children in the U.S. have enough lead in their blood to harm them," says Steve Tackitt, director of Wayne County Environmental Health. "This includes approximately 800 children in Wayne County." <br> The County's lead hazard program will offer a brochure entitled, "Is your child safe from lead poisoning? Learn how to protect your family."
